Ben has successfully represented municipalities in 80K land use enforcement actions, 80B appeals, and a variety of other matters. He has also appeared in court and before administrative agencies such as the Federal Communications Commission and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

During Law School, Ben served as the Executive Editor of the Ocean and Coastal Law Journal, interned with the Maine Public Advocate's Office, and practiced as a student attorney at the Cumberland Legal Aid Clinic. He also spent a semester in practice as a full-time extern with the Federal Communication Commission's Competition Policy Division in Washington, D.C.
